The line-up of speakers will include Jim Jermyn, Property Manager/Head Gardener at the National Trust for Scotland's Branklyn Garden in Perth; the AGS Associate Editor Robert Rolfe; and Paul Cumbleton, former head of the alpine section at RHS Wisley. More speakers will be announced soon.

News from the AGS Trustee Board

Website: The Board approved plans to redesign the Society's website. Feedback from a survey conducted last year will influence the construction of the site. This is a major project, particularly given the complexity of the existing site. Certain areas will be prioritised and the redesign will also affect the discussion area. At some point this will be closed while parts of the new site are implemented. Notice will be given when this is likely to occur nearer the time. Obviously there will be many other changes once the new site is up and running. The Board see this as a vital initiative to help secure the future of the Society.

Local Group Co-ordinators: The Board is seeking to appoint another Local Group Coordinator and will report on this to groups once an appointment has been confirmed.

Lake District conservation project: The Board was informed that a launch and planting day is scheduled to take place in March at the Haweswater site and a joint press release with the RSPB and United Utilities will be issued nearer the time. By this time fencing of the area should be almost complete.

Committee structure: The Trustees reviewed the existing committee structure and decided to abolish formal committees for seed, publications and tours. Instead each of these areas of activity will be discussed in full Trustee Board meetings. A small Editorial Board is to be established to advise on the Society's publications.

Online Plant Encyclopaedia: Steps are being taken to identify areas where further input is required and work on these areas will then be commissioned.

Rod Leeds, AGS Vice-President and Holding Trustee, has been awarded an RHS Veitch Memorial Medal that recognises contributions to the science, art and practice of horticulture. He was presented with the medal at an RHS Awards ceremony in London on February 22 by the RHS President Sir Nicholas Bacon. The Alpine Garden Society sends its warmest congratulations to Rod on this award with our grateful thanks for his continued support of the AGS across many areas of activity.







ROMANIA

June 30 - July 9, 2017 Leader: Razvan Chisu Cost: £1,400 including flights, single supplement £150

This is the first AGS tour to Romania **L** and offers the chance to explore what is one of Europe's last wild places. Romania has just over 3,000 species of plants and many endemics in an area smaller than the UK. The Carpathian mountain range is roughly 1,500km long, half of which is found in Romania. We will visit one location in the western range and two locations in the south. **Day 1** – Fly to Cluj-Napoca from Luton airport, aiming to arrive early afternoon. Visit to the botanical gardens (over 30 acres of diverse habitats, tropical greenhouses and Romania's largest herbarium). Stay overnight in Hotel Capitolina, five minutes from the town centre and the botanical gardens. **Day 2** – Drive to Turda Salt Mines, a popular tourist attraction ranked by Business Insider as the most beautiful underground place in the world, with an underground boating lake. Short botanising walk on salt flats near the mine. Afternoon drive to Rimetea (18 miles away) to botanise on the Piatra Secuiului limestone cliffs. Accommodation for two nights in Perla Trascaului Chalet, with stunning views of the Transylvanian landscape. Day 3 – A choice of walks in the Transylvanian wild meadows, which should be at their best. Expect to see species of Centaurea, Salvia



transsylvanica and *pratensis*, *Dianthus spiculifolius* and much more. **Day 4** – Drive to the Southern Carpathians. Accommodation for three nights in hotel Balea Cascada, at the base of Balea Waterfall.

Days 5 & 6 – A choice of botanising walks in the Făgăraş Mountains. Expect to see several species of *Saxifraga*, *Aquilegia transsilvanica*, *Viola dacica*, *Dianthus gelidus*, *Phyteuma confusum*, *Aconitum moldavicum*, *Silene dinarica* and many other plants.

Day 7 – Drive to Sinaia in the Bucegi Mountains, with lunch in Brasov. Accommodation for three nights in Hotel Carpathia in the Prahova Valley. Day 8 – By taking the cablecar we will reach the Bucegi plateau at 2,200m. Spend the day botanising on the plateau around the Sphynx (formed by wind erosion) looking for alpines like *Silene acaulis, Saxifraga demissa, Primula minima, Campanula carpatica, Eritrichium nanum* subsp. *jankae*, several species of *Draba, Campanula alpina* var. *bucegiensis*, etc.

Day 9 – Walks in Bucegi around Bolboci Lake and the limestone Zăgoanei gorge.
Day 10 – Fly back to the UK.

BHUTAN

June 2017

Leader: Martin Walsh Cost: In the region of £6,850 including flights

This, the first AGS expedition to central Bhutan, offers a unique opportunity to explore one of the richest floras in the Himalaya. The alpine regions in central Bhutan have not been explored to any great extent since the days of Ludlow and Sherriff. We will very much follow in their footsteps.

This exciting trek, which is the first of its kind, will take us close to the southeast face of Gangkhar Puensum, the highest unclimbed mountain in the world.

We will start with acclimatisation in western Bhutan, where we will travel by bus to the botanically rich Chele La, a 3,780m high pass west of Paro. We will then travel to Punakha in central Bhutan.

The trek will start at Dur in the Bumthang district, which is relatively low at just under 2,700m. We will trek through Himalayan forests that are home to many of the classic woodland plants from this region including cardiocrinums, arisaemas, maianthemums, primulas, orchids, ferns, rhododendrons and numerous spectacular trees and shrubs.

We will travel further north crossing several passes including the Jule La and the Gokthong La. A wealth of desirable alpines are to be found here including *Meconopsis bella*, *Primula umbratilis*, *Anemone rupicola* and the Himalayan giant rhubarb, *Rheum nobile*. The alpine meadows in this region are also rich in

primulas, pedicularis, anemones, asters and so on. We will also visit one of the few known localities of one of the rarest Himalayan lilies, *Lilium sherriffiae*.

From the hot springs at Dur Tsachu we will head north-east, crossing two further passes, Chachan La and the Tole La – an area which has not been explored since George Sherriff botanised here in 1949. After several days in these alpine habitats we will descend again to the forest zone. Once we reach Tsampa, we will head north to Gangkhar Puensum Base Camp where, weather permitting, we should have spectacular views. We will then head south to finish at Khakthang.

As parts of this trip are pioneering in nature, a fair degree of fitness will be required. However, it has been carefully planned so that we walk on average less than 10km per day for most of the trip.

Day 8 – Drive to Mirador de Nirihuau. We will walk up to Mirador de Nirihuau or even higher if time permits.

Day 9 – Drive to Bariloche steppe. Drive towards Pilcaniyeu, stopping to look at plants along the way.

Day 10 – Drive to Cerro Catedral and take cable car/chairlift. Botanise on mountain all day.

Day 11 – Boat excursion to Puerto Blest

and walk to Cascada Los Cantaras and forest to see forest plants.

Day 12 – Cerro Bayo ski resort with chairlift. This is a late mountain so you may find plants here that were flowered out elsewhere. Good walks at various levels.

Day 13 – Drive to San Martin de los Andes via the Paso Cordoba, botanising en route.

Day 14 – Drive to Cerro Chapelco and spend day on mountain.

Day 15 – Visit Cerro Colorado.

Day 16 – Drive to Junin de los Andes and L'Escorial on Lagunas

Epulafquen.

Day 17 – Cerro Colu Huincal.

Day 18 – Volcán Lanín.

Day 19 – Drive to Bariloche and catch

flight to Buenos Aires.

Day 20 – Fly BA to UK.

TASMANIA AND SE VICTORIA, AUSTRALIA

December 30, 2017, for 16 days departing from Hobart, Tasmania, ending in Melbourne

This tour, led by one of Australasia's leading naturalists, will spend ten days visiting some of Tasmania's finest botanical sites before flying on to Melbourne for six days of exploring south-east Victoria.

Tasmanian highlights will include a visit to Mount Field National Park, with alpine moorlands, spectacular mountain scenery and an excellent diversity of alpines including several endemic *Richea, Ewartia* and *Celmisia*.

In the central highlands, we will drive through the pass between the Cradle Mountain region and the Franklin-Gordon River National Park, looking for *Billardiera, Callistemon, Diplarrena* and other sub-alpine herbs such as *Milligania*.

In the vicinity of Lake Dove we will hike to Crater Lake and Cradle Mountain, with a wide array of subalpine shrubs and, above them, cushion flora.

On a day excursion to Ben Lomond National Park we'll use the ski-field access road to reach a plateau at 1,500m to make the most of magnificent scenery and unsurpassed alpine flora.

We will travel to the fascinating and scenic Freycinet National Park, staying in the oceanside Freycinet Lodge for

two nights, where you will see granite outcrops, rugged peaks, crystal clear water, beautiful orchids, wonderfully barked local *Eucalyptus* trees and Oyster Bay pines (*Callitris rhomboidea*).

From Melbourne we will visit the high peaks of the central section of Alpine National Park as well as several other fabulous sites.

During the tour there will be a host of wildlife to see, including platypus, wallabies, ospreys, snakes and wombats. An air-conditioned coach will be used throughout the trip with microphone, ample luggage storage in the trailer, and tea and coffee provisions. All accommodation is of a very comfortable standard and all rooms have private facilities. In most locations it is of 3-star equivalent, although better than this on occasion.

TAJIKISTAN & UZBEKISTAN

April 7-18, 2017 (extension to April 20) Leaders: Oron Peri & Andy Byfield Cost: £3,695

What a fantastic way to start a holiday – five million *Iris bucharica* stretching for miles in dense drifts of yellow blooms along the Karatag Valley. Eight fantastic Juno irises and eight tulips are the cream of an amazing array of bulbous species that cover the spectacular mountains and steppes of Tajikistan and nearby parts of Uzbekistan.

Tajikistan's capital, Dushanbe, is surrounded by flowery mountainsides. Hillsides are covered in pink-centred white Anemone tschernjaewii and scarlet Anemone bucharica. There's white and yellow Iris vicaria and pale lilac Fritillaria bucharica, Scilla puschkinioides and extra-large flowered Corydalis popovii, with long slender pink spurs and purple-black outer perianths.

On the Ansob Pass we'll find *Tulipa* praestans while dense carpets of golden yellow *Crocus korolkowii* produce bands of gold stretching from the road into spectacular high snowy mountains.

Tulipa montana and *Tulipa micheliana* join elegant *Corydalis maracandica* and a lovely *Corydalis* species with flowers an extraordinary mix of cherry-red, gold and pink as we move into Uzbekistan.

Famous Chimgan has *Corydalis darwasica*, *Tulipa tschimganica*, *Tulipa kaufmanniana* and *Fritillaria sewerzowii*, and nearby mountains are home to *Iris*

tubergeniana, abundant *Gymnospermium albertii* and pretty pink *Fritillaria stenanthera*.

Pale lilac *Iris magnifica* is a fantastic sight among the large granite boulders of the Amankutan Pass. Here little striped *Colchicum kesselringii* will hardly get a look-in as we admire the huge glossy goblets of *Tulipa fosterana*, dark pink *Primula fedtschenkoi* and the fine purple, blue and yellow *Iris warleyensis*.

We'll have a full day among the incomparable blue-tiled mosques and palaces of magical Samarkand and an extension to enjoy Bukhara's elegant Islamic architecture too.

BIG SNOW MOUNTAIN TO THE BALANG SHAN

May 12-30, 2017 Leader: Chris Gardner Cost: £5.325

These Chinese mountains are L bejewelled with so many choice and coveted flowers including, of course, several species of Meconopsis, these in blue, yellow, red and even (just about) black

Ernest Wilson scoured western Sichuan for exciting flora finding plant after fine plant including the red poppywort. However, it was Wilson's rival, Frank Kingdon Ward, who first found the mysterious black Primula, originally far to the west, but now rediscovered in Sichuan and we'll see this extraordinary flower alongside the inflated pouches of *Cypripedium calcicola*. Here also is electric-blue Corvdalis curviflora, fantastic Corydalis pachycentra and pale blue Paraquilegia microphylla.

We'll visit lamaseries and enjoy the different styles of houses that decorate the pastoral landscapes coloured by anemones and more than 60 species of many-hued Pedicularis. Around Tengchong we'll visit one of the favoured haunts of that most determined of plant-hunters, George Forrest, where he collected many species of rhododendrons, notably *Rhododendron glischrum* with huge trusses of pink flowers and Rhododendron sinogrande beset with pale cream flowers and huge paddleshaped leaves.



NATURAL HISTORY HOLIDAYS

Meconopsis integrifolia

In the Cangshan we'll find the scarlet Rhododendron neriiflorum, big-leaved Rhododendron lacteum and showy white Rhododendron pachypodum. Tucked in among dwarf rhododendrons are two charming lilies, souliei and lophophorum, and light woodlands are full of the pink saucers of Nomocharis pardanthina.

We'll see at least six species of slipper orchid, among them huge colonies of big maroon-pouched Cypripedium tibeticum. Other highlights will include 30 species of Primula, golden mats of Androsace *bisulca*, some fine pleiones, vivid orange Primula cockburniana, an array of cobra lilies, Paeonia veitchii, asarums, Iris chrysographes and drifts of deep pink Incarvillea mairei.

THE VERCORS

Apanorama of the snow-capped Alps forms a splendid backdrop to the Vercors, an entrancing mosaic of subalpine meadows, karst, gorges and mountain forests.

This is one of Western Europe's foremost wilderness areas - a limestone masterpiece whose origin lies far back in coral reefs that flourished in the Cretaceous period. We are offering two tours to this remarkable region – both set amid some of France's most beautiful scenery and both offering a wonderful range of fauna and flora.

May finds us among meadows full of colourful finery with massed displays of elder-flowered, lady and military orchids accompanied by cowslips, oxlips, wild tulips and pasque flowers. We'll encounter pretty citril finches and jaunty crested tits, while everywhere the abundance of birds of prey is notable with golden eagle, short-toed eagle and black kites.

On this early tour we'll encounter two very special orchids, the renowned lady's slipper and the endemic bee orchid Ophrys drumana. The Vercors is extremely rich in orchids with over 60 species known and our June tour will focus on some of the later-flowering species such as globe and vanilla orchids as well as offering a chance to see the capricious ghost orchid. In May many blue butterflies will already be on the wing but later, in June, the butterflies really come into their own. Both purple and lesser purple emperor frequent tranquil wooded valleys and twin-spot and niobe will be among a host of fritillaries. Idvllic Vercors is home to some of the finest flowers and butterflies in Europe and is in an area of great natural beauty encapsulating the very best of the French countryside. So good you could go twice!
