This year's AGS Annual Conference and our Autumn Bulb Day will both be held in new venues.

The AGM and Conference will take place on the weekend of November 17 and 18 at the four-star Alveston Manor Hotel and Spa in Stratford-upon-Avon, which is set in its own grounds just five minutes walk from the cultural attractions of the historic town.

This year's E.B. Anderson Memorial Lecture, which forms part of the AGM and is free to all members, will be given by orchid expert Phillip Cribb from the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew.

Conference speakers will include Sarah Carlton from St Andrews Botanic Garden, with more to be announced soon. Full details will appear in the June issue of AGS News.

The Autumn Bulb Day on Sunday, September 23, will be held at the

News from the AGS Trustee Board

Rebranding and new website: Work on the new website is progressing well and, as previously reported here, this will be combined with a totally new brand image for the Society, designed to appeal to younger generations of gardeners. This will include a new logo, which will replace both the old gentian logo and the blue flower logo that has been used in recent years. The rebranding will apply across the Society and all its activities. New publicity material will be produced and existing stocks are being run down to keep wastage to an absolute minimum.

It is essential that the new brand is applied across all AGS material, whether it be on paper or online, or at national or local level. Local groups and shows will be helped to replace existing branded posters, banners etc. with those bearing the new logo.

It is important that the Society has one national and international identity, especially as we enhance our online and social media presence on a variety of platforms.

Much has changed since the Society was first established in 1929 and the Trustees want to ensure that it remains appealing to our existing members but is also attractive to potential new members in the future.

On the new website, the Plant Encyclopaedia will provide detailed information in a more structured way to facilitate information searches. It is vital that while maintaining detailed botanical descriptions it should also be accessible to less knowledgeable gardeners and it will include more informal descriptions of plants.

AGS training placement at RBG Edinburgh: The Society is to fund a one-year training placement in the Alpine Section at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh. This is an excellent opportunity for someone to expand their horticultural knowledge. Full details and information on how to apply will be published shortly.

Appointment of new Holding Trustee: The Board appointed Joanne Everson as a new Holding Trustee. She is to replace Rod Leeds, who is stepping down from the role after serving for 11 years. The Board wished to express their thanks to Rod for his services during this period.

Local Group Co-ordinators: Trustees received an update on the activities of the two local group co-ordinators, David Charlton and Ben Parmee. David and Ben are proactively communicating with groups and have recently circulated various documents to groups, including information on how to create a local group Facebook presence and a Speakers Best Practice Guide. Any group that would like assistance with Facebook or social media can contact Paddy Parmee, who is the Local Group Social Media Co-ordinator.

AGS National Shows: It was agreed to trial some non-competitive classes for auriculas at the Wimborne Show. The trial will comprise three or four classes but no prize points will be awarded. A number of AGS members in the area grow these plants and the trial classes will provide an opportunity to display a wider range of plants than normally appears on the show benches.

The cold frames are 4ft wide and are available in three lengths: 4ft, 6ft and 8ft.

The sturdy, pressure-treated bases for the cold frames raise the frames to reduce bending. The bases are constructed from 1½in deck board which is mitred at the ends for a neat appearance. Stainless steel screws ensure a long life. The base can be filled with soil for direct planting, or a very sturdy timber floor can be added to allow alpines to be placed either directly on the boards or on a couple of inches of grit. A useful option is the louvre vent. This replaces one of the 2ft x 2ft sheets of glass at the end of the frame, providing additional ventilation. The louvre aids winter ventilation as the slats prevent rain ingress. A vent can be fitted at either or both ends and is available as a manual or fully automatic vent.



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SIKKIM

June 19-July 9, 2018 Leader: Harry Jans

Cost: in the region of £3,500

Day 1 – International flight to Dehli and domestic flight to Bagdogra.

Day 2 – Transfer to Darjeeling, crowned by the majestic Himalayas and fondly called the 'Queen of the Hills'.

Day 3 – Heritage Walk covering the Bhotay Busty Monastery and the Tibetan Self Help Centre. Drive to the Takvar Tea Factory for tea tasting.

Day 4 – Transfer to Gangtok passing through attractive temperate forests which are the habitat for orchid species and arisaemas.

Day 5 – Sightseeing in Gangtok covering the Plant Conservatory, Namgyl Institute of Tibetology, local market and experience the Cable Car ride.

Day 6 – Botanising at Tsomgo Lake and Kyongnosla Alpine Sanctuary, rich in both flora and fauna. Rare, endangered ground orchids and rhododendrons are among the important plants present.

Day 7 – Travel to Lachung through remote areas with narrow valleys, botanising en route. Lachung provides the base for exploring Yumthang, the Valley of Flowers, a paradise for nature lovers and botanists.

Day 8 – Drive to Dambung valley to explore the rich forest where we will find *Iris, Pleione, Arisaema, Cardiocrinum, Asarum, Paris, Roscoea, Trillidium, Rhododendron* and many more.

Day 9 – Botanise in Yumthang valley, famous for *Rhododendron* species.



Day10 – Further botanising in Yumthang valley.

Day11 – Explore the Yume Samdong area and zero point (Zadong).

Day12 – Transfer to Thangu.

Day 13 – Botanise in Yathang valley to see *Cypripedium* species.

Day 14 – A full day in the Thangu area.

Day 15 – Botanise east of Thangu towards Jachu Valley. We will encounter plants such as *Arenaria*, *Saxifraga*, *Gentiana*, *Thermopsis barbata*, *Meconopsis horridula*, *Cyananthus*, *Omphalogramma* and more.

Day16 – Transfer back to Gangtok.

Day 17 – Transfer to Kalimpong, botanising along the way.

Day18 – Fly to Dehli then drive to Agra.

Day 19 – Visit Taj Mahal and Agra Fort. Day 20 – Flight home.

WESTERN CAPE

August 30 to September 13, 2018 Leader: Callan Cohen Cost: in the region of £4,400

South Africa owes much of its unique botany to the tiny Cape Floral Kingdom, situated in the mountains of the southernmost tip of the continent.

Although tiny compared with the world's other floral kingdoms, it encompasses a staggering diversity of plant species that are found only here (for example, there are over 670 species of *Erica*!). In addition, the adjacent Succulent Karoo is the world's richest area for succulents, and the clay soils that form the common border of these two regions hold the greatest concentration of bulbous species in the world. We'll explore all these areas in spring, the peak time for flowering.

We'll begin our exploration on the 70km long mountainous spine of the Cape Peninsula. Here the Table Mountain National Park protects the unique 'fynbos' vegetation and patches of rare Afromontane forest.

Nestled below Table Mountain is the world-famous Kirstenbosch National Botanical Garden, where we will have time to explore the wide collection of plants from across the country.

The sandy shores of the West Coast, just north of Cape Town, hold a completely different flora, and we'll explore both the flashy displays of daisies on the coastal sands and the endemic-rich granites of the West Coast National Park. The nearby shales in the Darling area have





a profusion of bulbs, such as romuleas, babianas and the stunning geissorhizas.

We'll also explore the southern edge of Namaqualand, where the Cape Mountains give way to the valleys and plains of the arid Karoo and the landscape is dominated by small succulent bushes, prone to bursting into pink flower at this time of year. We will stay at charming local guesthouses and lodges.

THE PELOPONNESE

October 2018 for 10 days Leader: Răzvan Chişu Cost: in the region of £1,500.

Although the Peloponnese might be considered the cradle of Greek civilisation, with numerous archaeological sites to be explored, the peninsula is also a hotspot of biodiversity. There are more than 300 endemic plant species here and there are few places in the world that are better for autumnflowering bulbs. Join us for ten days exploring the Greek countryside in search of a wide variety of bulbs and the very last of the summer flowers.

We will visit Mycenae, where Sternbergia sicula and Arisarum vulgare grow in profusion; Mystras, a medieval city that has been deserted for centuries but where, apart from glorious views, one can see Campanula versicolor, Allium callimischon, Scilla autumnalis and Biarum tenuifolium; and Monemvasia, the island citadel that has good variable populations of Colchicum cupanii and Cyclamen crassifolium.

For three nights we will be based at Gythio, a lovely coastal town where, on the island of Cranea, *Cyclamen graecum* grows in every nook and cranny and each plant has a different leaf pattern. From there we will make several incursions into the Mani peninsula to visit sites where *Narcissus serotinus*, *Crocus boryi*, *Crocus niveus* and the endemic *Crocus goulimyi* grow.

Other species we hope to see during the tour include the autumn-flowering

snowdrop Galanthus reginaeolgae, Narcissus tazetta, Cyclamen hederifolium, Sternbergia lutea and Crocus melantherus.

Good food, a glass of retsina wine and a touch of history make for the complete Greek experience.

NORTHERN PATAGONIA AND MENDOZA

November 28 (fly from Heathrow) to December 19, 2018

Leader: Martin Sheader

Cost: TBA

The Andean mountains and steppe of northern Patagonia and Mendoza support a rich and fascinating flora set within spectacular landscapes. Our tour begins in northern Argentine Patagonia and from there we travel north into the wine-growing province of Mendoza.

At the very most, we walk a few kilometres a day, generally at a slow pace, to allow time for botanising and photography. At sites visited, altitude should not be a problem – we travel over one high pass at 3,800m. We aim to include elements of exploration in the tour, such as visiting a few sites in Mendoza that are new to us.

Zapala is our base for two nights. Our first visit is to the nearby Laguna Blanca National Park, a reserve supporting a rich steppe flora around a large lake. Here we expect to find several species of *Junellia*, including the rare *J. cedroides*, *Viola tectiflora*, *Rhodophiala mendocina*, cacti and several *Adesmia* species.

Next we travel westward towards the Andes, staying two nights at Villa Pehuenia on the shore of Lago Aluminé, a large glacial lake. En route, we travel through mountain passes with many flowers of interest, including *Jaborosa volkmannii*, *Viola coronifera* and *Calandrinia affinis*. Next we travel north to the town of Caviahue on the slopes of

the active Volcán Copahue. Interesting plants in this area include *Viola* caviahuensis, V. cotyledon, Famatina maulensis, Rhodophiala araucana and Olsynium frigidum.

Travelling further north, we spend four nights at Chos Malal, visiting a high pass, Paso Pichachen on the Chile/Argentina border, and spend two days exploring in the Tromen National Park. From here, we drive north to Mendoza Province before crossing the border to Chile, where we will spend a night at Los Andes.

At Malargüe we visit the scenic Reserva Provincial La Payunia, a spectacular dryland reserve, known for its volcanic landscapes, flora and fauna. At Los Molles, we visit a high mountain lake, Laguna Escondida above the ski resort of Las Leñas, where we should find *Viola* aff. atropurpurea, Calandrinia affinis, Discaria nana, Olsynium bodenbenderi and Tristagma sociale.

From the Argentine side of the Andes we botanise on the high slopes before travelling through the Uspallata Pass (3,800m) into Chile.

NEW CALEDONIA

September 2019 for 15 days Leader: Mark Hanger

N Tew Caledonia, an archipelago halfway between Australia and Fiii. is an extraordinary place. While it has all the features you might expect of tropical islands – white sands, blue lagoons and graceful palms – it is also home to some remarkable plants and wildlife. There are abundant conifers belonging the ancient plant family Araucariaceae, including the Cook pines, or Araucaria columnaris, which grow in the coral-derived soils along the coast.

New Caledonia is considered one of the world's most botanically important, and critically endangered places. Unlike many of the Pacific Islands, which are of relatively recent volcanic origin, New Caledonia is an ancient fragment of the Gondwana super-continent and 76 per cent of its flora is endemic.

The factors contributing to such a rich variety of plant life include the diversity

of climate, elevation and the type of soil. The biogeography of the island chain has been shaped by a complex and fascinating geological history.

But New Caledonia is mainly known for its lagoon. It is one of the three biggest reef systems in the world. It contains a rare diversity of coral and fish species, with reef structures that are among the most diverse on the planet.

The New Caledonian lagoon is home to unique marine biodiversity and a considerable number of iconic or endangered species, such as turtles, whales and dugongs: 15,000 of the 23,000 square kilometres of this area have been registered as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Ancient plant families are more heavily represented on New Caledonia than their more modern counterparts. The larger flora include Nothofagus, Beilschmiedia, Adenodaphne and members of Winteraceae and Myrtaceae. But the angiosperms are also fascinating, among them Amborella trichopoda, which is the sole member of the oldest living flowering plant lineage, Amborelleaceae.

THE VERCORS

Aps forms a splendid backdrop to the Vercors, an entrancing mosaic of subalpine meadows, karst, gorges and mountain forests.

This is one of Western Europe's foremost wilderness areas – a limestone masterpiece whose origin lies far back in coral reefs that flourished in the Cretaceous period. The Vercors offers some of France's most beautiful scenery and a wonderful range of fauna and flora, including meadows full of colourful

finery with massed displays of elderflowered, lady and military orchids accompanied by cowslips, oxlips, wild tulips and pasque flowers.

We'll encounter two very special orchids, the renowned lady's slipper and the endemic bee orchid *Ophrys drumana*.

Globe and vanilla orchids are two of over 60 species of orchids known from the Vercors. Butterflies will be starting to really come into their own. Both purple and lesser purple emperor frequent tranquil wooded valleys, and twin-spot and Niobe will be among a host of fritillaries.

Idyllic Vercors is home to some of the finest flowers and butterflies in Europe and is an area of great natural beauty encapsulating the very best of the French countryside.

JAPAN & **VLADIVOSTOK**

May 26-June 9, 2018

Leaders: Ian Green, Shigeto Tsukie & Seda Soylu

Though the south of Japan's I memorably scenic archipelago experiences a sub-tropical climate, the northernmost parts of the island chain have more in common with Siberia. A visit in June thus allows us to find many early spring bulbs where the snows are still receding and the more exotic flora of lower latitudes and elevations.

Hakuba-jiri's famous snowy valley on the slopes of Mount Shirouma (almost

3,000m) hold Glaucidium palmatum, Anemone flaccida, Primula jesoana, Paris japonica and the delicate, palest pink Pogonia japonica. A cable car allows an easy ascent of Mount Nyugasa in the centre of the Honshu Highlands. Here are Convallaria keiskei, Primula japonica, Rhododendron kaempferi, *Polygonatum humile* and *Rhododendron* japonicum. At Oyomi Bog deepest blue Iris laevigata is found with Iris sanguinea.

Lilies will be a major feature of this tour, as on Niigata we'll see Lilium rubellum growing amongst Rhododendron japonicum, while Oonokame hosts both Hemerocallis middendorffii var. exaltata and Lilium maculatum. Primula nipponica and Geum pentapetalum are two of Mount Zaou's many beautiful flowers.

ARGENTINA CACTI

October 1-17, 2018 Leaders: Willy Smith & Ian Green Cost: London to London. £5,595; Buenos Aires to Buenos Aires, £4,845

▲ vast array of cacti species are found Ain the mind-boggling landscapes of north-western Argentina, ranging from 300-year-old Trichocereus pasacana growing 3m tall, to the improbably tiny Blossfeldia liliputana.

The extraordinary growth forms of these cacti are many and varied and so are the often magnificent blooms. Tall, white-hairy Cleistocactus hyalacanthus has beautiful tubular pink flowers while the impressive orange-yellow blooms of Lobivia aurea dwarf the plant itself. We'll see saguaro-like Trichocereus terscheckii and exquisite Parodia mesembrina, the globular ball of spines overtopped by brilliant yellow blooms. Soehrensia formosa is a study



of brilliance, its scarlet blooms obvious from afar, and we'll see the extraordinary Rebutia senilis, a beauty whose squat little body is garlanded with magnificent blooms of red, yellow or orange.

Hieroglyph-engraved menhirs sit among dry Chaco forest where the arching columns of Echinopsis grandiflora serve as a vase for their red flowers and Rebutia *jujuyana* is encircled with jubilant orange blooms. We'll find plenty of evidence of the Inca's Empire of the Sun and other cultural wonders include picturesque Purmamarca, nestling at the foot of the Mountain of Seven Colours, its church adorned with cactus woodwork!
