2011 8th International Rock Garden **Conference - Additional Speakers**

This month's issue of *The Alpine Gardener* contains a number of tributes to Jim Archibald, whom we had been very much looking forward to hear delivering his lecture, 'Beyond the Last Frontiers', next April in Nottingham. Very sadly, this is not

to be. It was Jim's express wish that Henrik Zetterlund, of Goteborg Botanic Garden, Sweden, take his place. Henrick is an inspirational speaker and a man whose wide-ranging botanical travels have been inspired by his late friend lim.

Toshio Yoshida will be travelling from much further afield (Japan) to give an equally exciting lecture on the flora of the Himalaya. He has unrivalled experience of the whole range, having ventured to rarely-visited parts on many occasions, covering their whole length in sum. 'Endemism in Sino-Himalayan Alpines' will now appear in the programme on Friday, 15 April. This is a rare opportunity to hear Toshio speak about high alpine genera such as Meconopsis, Primula and Androsace: his photographs frequently draw superlatives, and his presence underlines the international complexion of this gathering.

Dr Geoff Mawson, OBE (Dronfield)

Geoff's interest in alpine plants has stretched over thirty years, strongly fostered by numerous visits to various alpine regions, and (since the early 1980's) through exhibiting at AGS Shows. He is deeply involved in the latter, as an exhibitor, as a judge and as an Assistant Director of Shows, and is a National Collection holder for the genus Lewisia. Geoff was appointed head teacher of a sizeable Sheffield school in 1982 and has worked in education all his professional life. Latterly he was a consultant head teacher, specializing in the education of young children, and those in mainstream schools with special educational needs. He was proud to receive an OBE for this work in 2005. Although recently retired, Geoff carries out bird and plant inspections for DEFRA, and also does voluntary work. He feels that his long experience of leadership, his knowledge of science and nature and his long association with the Alpine Garden society equips him to make a worthwhile contribution as a member of the main Committee.

Mrs Jo Walker (Solihull)

Jo is a longstanding member of the AGS who has been active locally, in the Birmingham area, and nationally as a past Member of Committee. She successfully established and then ran our Malvern Show for a number of years, but is also very familiar with the affairs of Local Groups and with the wider responsibilities that fall on Committee members. ANNUAL AWARDS FOR 2010

Lyttel Trophy

The Society's premier award to those who have made an outstanding contribution to the world of alpine plants.

Dr Vojtěch Holubec

Vojtěch Holubec has been at the forefront of Czech alpine gardening for some years, but he is moreover a figure of international renown whose acclaimed lectures are very fluently delivered to audiences far and wide. (His ability to speak several languages has given him access to important floras not intelligible to most rock gardeners. This has greatly benefited our collective knowledge of the mountain plants of the Tien Shan, Kamchatka and the Caucasus – on which he has co-authored an important work, 'The Caucasus and its Flowers').

The seedlist that he issues annually is a prime source of high alpine, and unfailingly offers an exciting, diverse range of species. His work as an agricultural botanist, and his apparent yen to visit every single one of the world's mountain ranges, have taken him repeatedly to places little visited by his contemporaries, and he has made many important plant introductions from seed. Some of these – the Caucasian Saxifraga x dinninaris for example – are new to science, and he has described them himself. Various Chinese provinces, Tibet, Sikkim, Uzbekistan through to Kyrgyzstan, much of Turkey, Iran, the Caucasus, mountain ranges through Europe, the Rocky Mts, Patagonia: his energetic travels have taken him to the highest parts, as his writing, lectures and photographs (his mountainscapes in particular are exemplary) attest.

His garden on the outskirts of Prague is remarkable, and intelligently planted throughout; here is the most eclectic collection of dwarf, hardy plants imaginable – an immaculate grouping of witches' broom conifers (an early enthusiasm), Tibetan gentians growing on damp, shaded, near-vertical banks, and rarities aplenty thriving and in character atop carefully constructed pinnacles and colonizing seemingly natural screes. It is a model of how a rock garden should look.

In 2004 he was elected President of the Prague Rock Garden Club and he also helped to mastermind the very successful First International Czech Alpine Plant Conference, held at Beroun. Vojtěch is a distinguished, very knowledgeable, persuasive ambassador on all matters relating to alpine plants.

Sir William & Lady Lawrence Award

An international Award given to someone under 35 years of age who has made a contribution to work with alpines - cultivation, research etc. - Not Awarded

Award of Honour

This award recognizes sterling work undertaken on behalf of the Society, not necessarily during the year, but over a period of time

Jon Evans – works tirelessly on behalf of the Society. He is best-known to most members for his superlative photographic displays at AGS Shows in various parts of the country. These are well thought out and highly instructive and his recent display of 'Alpines in Close-up' exemplified this. His advice to the Director of Shows on the development of the Photography Classes at shows has been invaluable. Jon has also recently taken on the task of Show Secretary at the notoriously difficult London Show

Jon's most important contribution by far to the work of the Society has been to take on the responsibility for organizing the Society's rapidly growing collection of digital images, initially concentrating on the images taken at shows. This has involved the development of systems for cataloguing and indexing these images (by no means an easy task). Jon's work in this area has greatly assisted the lives of the Show Report Co-ordinator, the Webmaster, and the Editor and Assistant Editor of The Alpine Gardener.

Doreen & Eric Webster – Doreen and Eric instigated the Loughborough Spring Show nearly 20 years ago, in 1991, and have run it meticulously ever since. In 1995 they pioneered the Society's first non-competitive display at the same venue but a month earlier. In 2005 they uniquely took on the challenge of a third event, the Loughborough Autumn Show, which replaced the show previously held in the Wirral.

Doreen has been a very active member of the Derby, Nottingham and Leicestershire local groups for almost 30 years and has taken on the roles of Chair, Programme Secretary and Treasurer, sometimes simultaneously between two groups. Eric Webster's professional background has benefitted the Society in the photographic competition (which he has frequently judged) and as an occasional show photographer. Few have served the Society so actively and so sustainedly.

The Ferrier Charlton Award

This award recognises outstanding work for the Society in an administrative or managerial capacity. Jeremy Pratt held the post of Advertisements Manager in the Society for nine years. He was responsible for all the administrative work associated with the advertisements featured in The Alpine Gardener. This involved liaising directly with clients regarding their requirements and ensuring that all adverts were compiled promptly and accurately ready for publication each quarter. This necessitated working to tight deadlines, together with an eye for detail and also maintaining good relationships with our advertisers. Jeremy was extremely dedicated in his work and made sure that the operation ran smoothly throughout the time he was in post.

The Kath Dryden Award

This award recognises meritorious work and expertise in advancing our knowledge and understanding of the cultivation of a genus or group of alpine plants - **Not Awarded**

Local Group Awards

These awards recognise outstanding service within a Local Group over a number of years, the impact of which is felt more widely than just the local area.

Roger Beecham – has been a member for over 20 years and Chairman of the South Lancs Group for three years. For the last ten years he has been Show Secretary for the AGS national Show at Southport, which he has run extremely efficiently. He is also a regular exhibitor at AGS Shows and obtained two Farrer Medals and a Gold Merit Medal. As part of his enthusiasm for showing Roger has introduced a successful 'Mini-Show' to encourage local group members to gain experience in showing. He opens up the hall for the regular monthly group meetings, clears up afterwards, provides plants for the sales table and takes responsibility for the group projector.

Outside the Group he opens his own garden to the general public on a regular basis. He makes a valuable contribution to the display staged by the Group at the Southport Flower Show each year, as well as speaking to the visitors and dealing with publicity.

Margaret Glynn – has been an outstanding Group Officer for many decades having served as both Chair and Treasurer. She has diligently and with great efficiency looked after the group investments and finances, as well as instigating travel awards and prizes to students at Greenmount Horticultural College. Margaret has kindly extended the greatest possible hospitality to AGS visitors, including Presidents, judges and on two occasions entertained the entire Joint Rock Garden Plant Committee. For many years Margaret has organized an annual 4/5 day gardening trip for members to the ROI, Scotland, England and on two occasions the Czech Republic. Margaret has encouraged group members and the public to extend their knowledge and interest in new ways and methods of growing alpines, having invited a Czech expert to visit Northern Ireland and construct several crevice gardens (including one at Greenmount College). She has an extensive well planted garden which is a Mecca to gardeners from around the world and has kindly allowed her garden to be used for AGS group visits, gardening demonstrations and Group fund raising activitities.

Elsie Willett – Elsie and her husband Ivan joined the AGS Befordshire Group in the late eighties, soon after it started. She has supported the Group through a number of minor roles and volunteered to join the Group Committee in 1995 where she took on the roles of Secretary and Show Secretary. She has had responsibility for arranging group meetings and running eleven Group shows. In addition she has also written over 130 newsletters for the group.

Elsie's activities are not confined to the Bedfordshire Group. She has given a number of alpine talks to other local gardening groups, advocating the benefits of the Society. On a national level she has supported the Society with many of its activities. At the many AGS national shows she attends Elsie has been a steward and helped with the AGS publicity stand. In recent years she has also helped on the Society's stand at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show selling books and more importantly helping to recruit new members. Elsie does everything she can to help support her fellow alpine growers and promote the Society.

Website Award to recognise the best contribution to the Society's website during 2010

Professor John Richards – Since his retirement as President in 2006, Jon has continued to serve the Society by keeping Website Readers entertained with a weekly blog from his Northumberland Garden. In the year 2009 covered by this award, the 35 entries in the Blog ranged from the first flowers of *Primula irregularis* appearing on 4 January, though to spectacular pictures of his garden under a blanket of snow on 29 December. In between, we were presented with a superb range of alpines and information about how he grows them. John has also contributed to other areas on the website by answering questions put forward by other members. He is fully deserving of this award in recognition of the tremendous amount of time and energy he has devoted to his articles on our website.

Seed Exchange 2010/2011

Exciting News for this Year's Seed Exchange Distribution No 59 2010/2011

This year members will have a choice of either ordering their seed on-line or by the usual postal system. Details are as follows:

On-Line Ordering - New system introduced last year will enable you to order and pay for your seed on-line. This system worked well and was very well received with 1/3 of orders coming in this way.

Seed List

Ordering by Post - If you wish to order by post, as in the past, simply complete and return your form as indicated. Everyone who donates seed this year (2010/2011) and all those who ordered seed last year (2009/2010) will automatically receive a Seed List, anyone else, including Overseas and UK members, who wish to receive a copy of the Seed List in November 2010 must apply to: Alpine Garden Society, AGS Centre, Avon Bank, Pershore, Worcestershire, WR10 3JP. Email: ags@ alpinegardensociety.net before 9th November 2010. No envelope, label or stamp is required.

To ensure fairness

• All Orders will be picked in strict rotation with day one email orders and day one postal orders being grouped together so you are in no way disadvantaged if you choose to order by post in the usual way.

Donors

- As usual, donors will get priority over non-donors and will receive an increased allocation at ordering time.
- To qualify for donor status you will need to send in at least **7 different species** preferably suitable for the rock garden or alpine house before **II October 2010**.
- Details of how to donate and where to send your donation were included in the June newsletter and the information is also available on the AGS website.

Please consider donating, even small quantities, as you may be the only person sending that particular species in!

Volunteer Help Required

Packing Seed - Volunteers are needed to help with packing of seed. The seed will be posted to you with full instructions on how to complete the job. You will be able to pack seed in your own home during the last week of October and through November.

Making up/filling of seed orders - Volunteers are also needed to help with the making up of seed orders received from members. This takes place at AGS Centre during December and the first two weeks of January. You may like to make up a car load of helpers from your local group and come over to Pershore for a day to help? Drinks (non-alcoholic) are provided, plus excellent cake!

Regulations for US Members wishing to order seed through the Seed Distribution

US members who wish to order seed from the AGS seed distribution must send in an Import Permit with their order. If you did not order seed last year, you will need to apply for a new permit and send this in with their order. The permits are available from the US Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and this means that we no longer need to send seed out with a phytosanitory certificate.

Permits are free and will be valid for 3 years. Details about the permit can be found at:

To apply for a permit on-line, go to

http://www.aphis.usda.gov/permits/ppq_epermits.shtml

and click on PPQ 587 – Application to import plants and plant products – where you will be then able to register and then apply on-line for a permit. Or you can download PPQ Form 587, print and fill it out. The completed and signed application needs to be sent to the address at the end of the instructions. You will then be sent a permit to import small lots of seed and several green and yellow mailing labels, with the address of the Inspection Station already printed on them.

To order seeds from the AGS seed exchange, you will need to send with your seed order a photocopy of your import permit and one green and yellow label for every 50 packets or less that you order (50 - 100 packets will require 2 permits and 2 green and yellow labels, etc). You do not need to provide an address label. Please consult the lists of seeds that are not permitted under the

permit by referring to the lists on the website. AGS Seed distribution team will not send banned seed and will substitute another seed from your order, so it would be helpful if you refer to the lists in advance.

The AGS Seed Distribution team will place inside the package with your seeds: a list of your seed order according to the requirements on the permit, the copy of your permit and a printed label with your name and address. The Distribution team will paste the green and yellow label on the outside, to direct the package to the Inspection Station. At the Station, your seeds will be checked and then resealed, and the mailing label will be pasted on the outside of the shipment. The whole thing will be returned to the mail system, and forwarded to you.

Details of these arrangements will also be provided with the seed list, but bear in mind that when you receive the list you will not have time to apply for your permit, you need to do this **now.**

Post Conference Tour to Parnassos and the northern Greek Peloponnese

29th April-May 9th 2011

We are delighted to offer this eleven-day tour to Parnassos and the northern Greek Peloponnese, to be led by John Richards, former President of the Alpine Garden Society and author of Mountain Flower Walks – The Greek Mainland, published by the AGS.

The tour starts on April 29th 2011 at the magical town of Delphi, 'navel of the world', on the lower slopes of Parnassos. Beautiful plants occur on walls throughout the town, and we shall visit Daphne jasminea in its most accessible site. Driving up the mountain on good roads we shall see Tulipa australis, Bellevalia ciliata, Iris attica, three crocuses, three corydalis, two fritilaries and quantities of other bulbs. Delphi is a good orchid site and we will visit the ruins.

Driving to the Peloponnese, we aim to stay in the small town of Kalyvrita, and then move on to a superb hotel at Zarouchia, close to the source of the Styx. In this region, Cyclamen peloponnesianum and Asperula arcadiensis are widespread, and many rare alpines are washed down the Styx onto river gravels. Bulbs and alpines high on Chelmos are rich, and we will see Crocus sieberi 'tricolor', C. olivieri, Colchicum triphyllum, Gymnospermum albertii and much else. One excursion will take us to see the almost mythical Adonis cyllenea and we will visit the lake and ancient monastery of Pheneos. On the way to our last stop in the beautiful Venetian port of Nafplio we shall take in the little-known and superb ancient site of Nemea, full of orchids, and visit a site for the little-known Biarum spruneri.





The Hotel Bristol is welcoming, very comfortable, and with good food and conveniently near to the village centre. It is an excellent introduction to alpine flowers and wildlife and with experienced leaders will ensure you get the most from your visit to this beautiful and quiet traditional part of the Swiss Alps.

INDIAN HIMALAYAS

Saturday 2nd July – Sunday 24th July 2011 (23 days) LEADERS: MARGARET & DAVID THORNE Cost: circa £2.950

This Tour comprises two treks, both in scenically stunning and botanically rewarding locations in the Indian Himalayas. After 8 days exploring the Rupin and Nalgan Passes above the Baspa Valley, north-east of Shimla, we drive via the lalori Pass to a comfortable hotel in Manali. From here we visit the Rohtang Pass by Land Cruiser, then trek for 4 days over the Hampta Pass. We follow in the footsteps of Henry and Margaret Taylor who have thoroughly explored these areas, and provided much valuable.

Some of the exciting species we expect to see include: Androsace, Arenaria, Cardiocrinum, Corydalis, Cremanthodium, Iris, Lilium, Pedicularis, Potentilla, Primula, Rhodiola, Rhodode-ndron, Saussurea, Saxifraga, Waldheimia and a good selection of orchids.







The Tour will be limited to 20 members including leaders and should only be contemplated by the adventurous and fit, as it involves some long walking days to a maximum altitude of 5030m, and camping above 4000m.

The cost of the Tour includes all flights, land transportation by train (including the 'Toy Train' from Kolka to Shimla), coach and 4 wheel drive vehicles, the two treks, accommodation, and food apart from lunches and dinners in Delhi and Manali. A 2-day sightseeing extension, for visits to the Red Fort and Taj Mahal will be arranged at extra cost if there are sufficient members interested in this.

Turkey & Lebanon 3rd - 17th May 2011

rises are amongst the world's most beautiful plants and for many the crème de la crème of this genus are the fabulous Oncocyclus. Their improbably large blooms are a feature of some of the Middle-East's finest botanical areas. This tour takes us to strikingly beautiful Lebanon, now again welcoming tourists, where the cedar forests host fantastic purple-lined Iris cedretii, stunning pale Iris lortetii and impressive Iris westii. Elegant Iris sofarana is found on the alpine slopes of ten thousand foot Qurnat as-Sawda and Mount Hermon. Between cedars and maquis on the slopes of Ehden are Komper's Orchid, whilst on the edge of the Great Rift at Yammouneh are Allium libani and Himantoglossum affine.

Moving into Turkey we'll find shapely Iris sprengeri near Nigde before spending nine days moving steadily eastwards visiting populations of variable Iris sari, local Iris kirkwoodii and some magnificent stands of one of the finest of them all, silken Iris gatesii. We finish around gorgeous Lake Van where magnificent Iris iberica is joined by blue Iris barnumae and furry-falled Iris paradoxa. An abundance of superb bulbs en route!





Trilliums of Ontario

9th - 23rd May 2011

time in etween winter snows and summer leaf-burst there's a magical time in Ontario's woodlands - the great spring flower show. The Provincial flower, Trillium grandiflorum, blooms throughout in magnificent stands of white and green, with dark red Trillium erectum, and plentiful yellow Erythroniums. The Bruce Peninsula's limestone alvars are home to Goldthread, Clintonia, Striped Coralroot and Dwarf Lake Irises, whilst exquisite Calypso Orchids nestle amongst the mosses of Flowerpot Island. Tom Thomson's evocative Algonquian landscapes captured what for many is the perfect tranquillity of the Canadian Backwoods, and in these very woods we'll encounter Pitcher Plants, Dicentras, Gaywings, Trailing Arbutus, and fantastic shows of Painted Trilliums. Further south, the waters' tumultuous descent over Niagara Falls is hardly calmed through the deep gorge below. Here forests of the Carolinian realm thrive on the warm slopes and are rich in spring ephemerals such as abundant Trilliums, Twisted-Stalks/Uvularia's and Cucumber-roots, and there's lack-inthe-Pulpits, all sorts of Violets, Foamflowers and stands of lovely Aquilegias. Fauna will include Black Bears and Moose, and everywhere colourful warblers sing amongst some of the finest flowery woodlands in North America.







Pyrenees 10th - 23rd June 2011

Cost circa £2565

le start our exploration of the wild and craggy Pyrenees in verdant Tor, close to the Andorran border, and in the magnificent 'enchanted mountains' of Aigues Tortes, one of Spain's most beautiful National Parks. Apollos float over carpets of yellow Vitaliana, Viola cornuta, and elegant Snowbells. The two large trumpet gentians/Gentiana acaulis and Gentiana/ alpina offer their magnificent blue trumpets in abundance and we'll see plenty of smaller Gentians too. Four pink Primula species make a fine show along with Polygalas and several fine Sempervivums. Lammergeiers cruise the blue skies while white Pyrenean Saxifrages erupt from cliffs like miniature waterfalls and lovely blue Ramonda myconi forms pretty gardens on wet rockfaces. On the French side we'll explore the magical Cirque de Gavarnie and the Neouvielle, a land of alpine grasslands, crystal clear lakes, forests of Beech and Silver Fir and snow-capped mountains. Ptarmigan and Alpine Accentors inhabit passes where Androsaces and Saxifrages cling tightly to rocks, the former including chamaejasme/villosa/pyrenaica and carnea/subspecies/laggeri/Nigritella austriaca is abundant in meadows with Pulsatillas, Aconitums, Globeflowers and white Ranunculus species.

Autumn Bulbs of Jordan 24th November 2010 - 3rd December 2010

orming the eastern margin of the deep rift that descends to over a thousand feet below sea level on the shores of the Dead Sea are the mountains of Western lordan, an area with a rich and distinctive flora set amid stunning landscapes. Surrounding the hilltop villages are terraces which in the cool of the desert winter host abundant bulbous species, most notably Crocuses. We'll see elegant Crocus aleppicus, lots of Crocus hyemalis, newly described Crocus nagabensis and the lovely Crocus moabiticus. We'll visit a number of lordan's archaeological sites, most of them excellent areas for flowers, and in particular magnificent Petra, one of the world's most superlative historical sites. The beautiful sandstone mountains surrounding Petra are peppered with Biarums as well as Colchicum ritchii and Colchicum heirosolymitana. Delicate Bellevalia desertorum blooms with Androcymbium palaestinum and we'll look for rare Iris postii whilst much commoner are both Crocus cancellatus and Colchicum brachyphyllum.
